Common Expressions in the Work Place (Part 2)

Go'kuro'o-sama and o'tsukare-sama

Both are used to express your gratitude for someone's work or to express your consolation for someone's hard work.

The key words are really *kuro'o* and *tsukare*. Both *go* and *o* are honorific prefixes and *sama* is a suffix to show respect and genteelism.

Kuro'o means trouble(s); hardship(s); suffering(s); toil(s); pains(s); anxieties and worries. So, you want to say "go'kuro'o-sama" to someone who has had a hard time; who has gone through hardship; who has worked hard; who has taken extra effort; or who has worried much.

Tsukare, on the other hand, means tiredness and exhaustion both physical and mental. So, you want to say "o'tsukare-sama" to someone who is fatigued from long / tedious work: or suffering from mental strain. (Like someone who is back from a long business trip.) We often say "o'tsukare-sama" to each other after a long session of a business meeting.


